Water Fest 4 June 2022

We shared a stand with the Friends of Reading Museum. We displayed information about our Look Draw Build project for Primary Schools. John Nixon explained about his book "**The Gentlemen Danes of Reading**" and had his picture taken with the Mayor of Reading. It will be held on 10 June 2023, again we will share with the Friends. Heritage Open Days 9-18 September 2022.

- 12 September John Missenden gave his new talk about Georgian Reading in the Garden Hall of Watlington House. **Approx 60** people attended.
- 16 September "The story of Buckler Cars" by David Montgomery, Registrar of Buckler Cars. Approx 30 people attended. Held in Thames Lido it attracted a very different audience. It linked in with the unveiling of the BP on Caversham Rd.
- Walks 10+16 September A new RCS/ Walkabout event; The Mount, Redlands Road & Alexandra Road Conservation Areas. Approx 15 people on each. We dropped in on Adam Sowan to pick up copies of his book about New Road. Terry has run the walk since.

10 September the Blue Plaque to Joseph Huntley unveiled -21 Christchurch Road.

Diz Adleman, organised a blue plaque to mark Joseph's time (1837-1842) on her house

The society, with her neighbours, members of the CAAC and others, supported & guided Diz in the process of; developing the idea of a BP, applying for planning consent and finding a maker of the plaque and the chaps who erected it.

The plaque was unveiled by Chair of Reading Civic Society.

Following the unveiling there was a presentation in nearby Christ Church about the history of Huntley & Palmers. It was attended by around 50 people.

7 October Service to mark the start of the Judicial Year in Reading Minster

Several members took up the invitation to attend this service at the invitation of the High Sheriff, Alka Karbanda. A service which drew on her Hindu faith and certainly with a difference with Sikh drummers, some pyrotechnic and a large number of her family and friend. The church was filled.

November & Jan 23 meetings with Reading College team

In November along with Alex Brannen (REDA) I met members of the staff. They wished to engage students more in the community. We subsequently suggested a group of students might wish to undertake the photo survey for the Eldon Square Conservation Area Appraisal update. Nothing ever came of it. Early in 2023 I met with their new CEO Gary Headland DL. There may be opportunities to engage the students but it has to be very targeted time wise.

31 November Visit to the Mayor's Parlour

22 members visited the Parlour at the invitation of the Mayor, Cllr Rachel Eden. Rachel explained about the Mayoralty, with additions from Richard Stainthorp. On show were images of past Mayors back to the Victorian era. We were shown some silverware commissioned from Gerald Benney to celebrate the completion of the IDR.

Annual Luncheon at Pepe Sale, 12 November 2023

Approx 30 people attended this year. Many thanks to Clare Platts and Penny Kemp for organising the event, to Chris Widdows for his quiz. The lower numbers than pre-Pandemic enabled a square table layout, which was felt to be better than long tables. The food did not receive great feedback and the staff were clearly struggling. Bel and the Dragon will be the venue on November 2023.

C. Newsletter.

We do not have the physical resources to continue to prepare and publish a newsletter in the old way. During 2022 we issued 15 email updates (copied to those not on email) (17 in 2021). Newsletters when produced are sent to 3 Ward Councillors, MPs, Civic Voice and others.

D. Civic Voice Membership

In 2021 Civic Voice faced a financial problem following a theft by their Treasurer. They appealed to Societies for support. The committee decided to make an advance payment on subscriptions of £300. Based on membership our subs for 2022 were £255 so we will not have to pay during 2023 and will have a small credit into 2024.

E. Membership of Reading Groups

We joined Connect Reading (£25 per year), which has been running for 30 years, and the First Friday Club. We will review after a year.

F. Planning

We continued to review Reading Borough Council's planning applications. Lack of a dedicated Planning Officer means we have to target Civic Society comments on areas of specific engagement. We have increasingly worked with the Conservation Area Advisory Committee to provide a comment on applications.

We continue where possible to engage early with developers as this assists our understanding of the constraints of a site and developer's plans.

- March we held a discussion with the owners of Bristol and West Arcade.

- 30 June we organised a Zoom event update on their plans, 30 people attended.
- 2nd November we organised a Consultation at Haslams Estate Agents
 Around 40 people, including several shop unit tenants, attended this first physical consultation in Reading about a planning application since the start of the pandemic.

G. <u>Membership Report</u> Note previous year in brackets

Subscriptions for 2022 total £1,110 (2021£1,350 £1,305 2020, £1,620 2019, £1,483 2018).

As at March 2023 there are 185 members (last year 175) (3 honorary life members – last year 6). We have issued 53 Pink Elephant membership chasers and subs are coming in.

Since the 20220 AGM we have had 12 new members, making 24 since 2020.

14 members do not have online access and receive notification of the AGM and the relevant documents by post. They receive hard copies of email updates which are now used in place of printed newsletters.
